

# RRCA SCHOOL SUPPLY LIST

## 2019-2020

### ***Mandatory items to bring to school daily:***

- Headphones/earbuds (mandatory)
- Three ring binder, which must include subject dividers, Math, Science, etc., lined filler paper, and a minimum of 10 sheet protectors
- Zippered supply pouch along with white erasers, Pens and #2 pencils for daily use
- **USB Flash Drive (minimum 4Gb)**
- **TI-84 Plus Calculator for High School Students (marked clearly w/student name)**
- **Scientific Calculator for Middle Schools Students (marked clearly w/student name)**

### ***Bring the first day of school and leave at school:***

- 1 - Roll of paper towels
- 1 - Box tissue
- 1 - Lg. container of Disinfectant wipes (ANY BRAND IS OK)
- 1 - PKG post it notes (3 x 3 or larger)
- 1 - pkg colored markers (not colored pencils)



**Parking Permit Fee:** Parking permits will be available for a fee (\$5.00) beginning on August 13, 2019 (not any sooner). Parking spaces will be assigned first come first served starting with the Senior Class, then the Junior Class followed by the sophomore class. To receive your parking space/permit, you **MUST** have ALL of the required paperwork **COMPLETED** for authorized parking on campus. If your paperwork is **NOT** complete you will **NOT** be assigned a parking space/permit until you have all of the completed paperwork. All vehicles must display a current, valid parking permit hung over the rear-view mirror inside the front windshield of the car. Once all parking spaces have been assigned and there are no parking spaces left, RRCA will not issue any more parking permits (this includes midyear birthdays of upperclassman).

**PSAT Test:** 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students will take the PSAT on Wednesday, October 16, 2019. There is **NO COST** to the 10<sup>th</sup> grade students. 11<sup>th</sup> grade students who wish to take the PSAT will need to remit \$16.00 for the 10/16/2019 test **NO** later than September 30, 2019.

(Taking the PSAT/NMSQT in 10th grade and again in 11th grade gives students a fresh skills assessment and a measure of their progress, as well as the chance to compete for scholarships. Historically, U.S. students who took the PSAT/NMSQT in 10th and 11th grades scored higher on the SAT than students who did not.)
